



WEEKLY REPORT

January 30 – February 5, 2012

HOME INVASION

On January 30th, at approximately 6:30 p.m., a resident of the 30000 block of Nine Mile Road came home to find that her front door was damaged and her house burglarized. Officers checked the home and the area but were unable to locate a suspect. The homeowner advised that she had left for work at 7:00 a.m. and returned at 6:30 p.m. An investigation done by this department's detective bureau has already uncovered one possible suspect.

LARCENY

On January 31st, a tenant at Valley View Condominiums reported the theft of four personal checks by her ex-boyfriend. The ex-boyfriend stole the checks from her checkbook while doing home repairs at the unit. The checks were subsequently forged and cashed in other jurisdictions. The tenant did not wish to prosecute but wanted the incident documented.

ASSIST CITIZEN

On January 31st, officers were dispatched to the area of Longacre Street to assist a mother in locating her severely autistic child. The mother advised that her son often gets distracted and will disappear when the mother is not looking. The son was located several doors down from the home at a neighbor's house.

CONCEALED PISTOL LICENSE VIOLATION

On January 31st, a Chevrolet Tahoe was stopped for crossing the double yellow line at Grand River and Farmington Road. The officer approached the driver, advised him the reason for the stop, and collected his information to write a citation. A LEIN/SOS check of the driver revealed that he is licensed to carry a concealed permit. The officer returned to the driver and inquired as to whether he was armed or not. The driver admitted that he was armed and that he forgot to inform the officer as required by state law. In addition the man advised that he had forgotten his Concealed Pistol License (CPL) at home yet was still carrying the firearm. The officer cited the man for failing to disclose to an officer that he has a CPL and for not having his CPL on his person while carrying a firearm. Both violations are civil infractions so the man was released with a citation. The Oakland County Gun Board was advised of the violation.

MALICIOUS DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY

On February 3rd, reporting person (RP) came into station to report a Malicious Destruction of Property (MDOP). The RP had been renting a condo in Heritage Village. She hired a property management company to handle the rental. The renters moved out ten months prior to the agreement. When the RP and the management company checked the location, they found approximately \$15,000 in damage to the condominium (paint poured on carpet, bb holes in walls and numerous other damage). The case is being presented to the prosecutor's office to determine if it's criminal or civil.

FALSE IDENTIFICATION/WARRANTS OTHER POLICE DEPARTMENTS

On February 4th, an officer observed a suspicious occupied vehicle parked in the parking lot of the Valero gas station at Grand River and Orchard Lake Road. The business was closed and dark. The officer made contact with the occupants and attempted to identify them. The male driver produced a driver's license and stated he was lost. The female passenger verbally identified herself but gave various dates of birth and ages during the officer's field interview. The female passenger (twenty years old) was arrested for furnishing false identification. The passenger eventually provided her correct name and date of birth. The passenger admitted to giving false information because she had three outstanding warrants out of Southgate, Dearborn and Plymouth. The officer issued the passenger a citation for furnishing false identification and she was held pending receipt of bond money or morning arraignment.

OPERATING WHILE INTOXICATED

On February 4th, an officer observed a vehicle eastbound on Grand River near Farmington Road travelling at a high rate of speed. The officer paced the vehicle at 41 mph in the 25 mph downtown district. A traffic stop was conducted at Grand River and Lakeway. The officer detected an odor of intoxicants coming from the vehicle. The driver admitted to consuming two drinks at the Grand Tavern in Farmington Hills. The driver failed field sobriety tests and submitted to a PBT with results of .09(3) and .09(8). The driver was arrested for Operating While Intoxicated (OWI) and the vehicle was turned over to a passenger. The driver submitted to a breath test at the station with a result of .10/.10. The officer issued the driver a citation for OWI. The driver was held until sober.

TRAFFIC COMPLAINT

On February 4th, at approximately 4:05 p.m., officers were dispatched to the area of Locust and Shiawassee for a report of two men arguing. Upon arrival officers found the men in the Farmington Hills' jurisdiction of Locust Street. Both men had attempted to go opposite ways on the narrow street and both were refusing to back their vehicle up in order for the other one to pass. The incident was mediated and both agreed to move their vehicles to allow the other to pass.

LARCENY OF SHRUBBERY

On February 4th, an officer responded to Heritage Condominiums for a report of a stolen shrub. Upon arrival the responding officer interviewed management who advised that

sometime overnight an unknown person removed a three foot tall Blue Spruce evergreen that had recently been planted. Management has no suspects.

MARIJUANA/DRUG PARAPHERNALIA

On February 5th, a vehicle was stopped near Grand River and Orchard Lake for a headlight violation. The officer detected an odor of marijuana coming from the interior of the vehicle. The occupants denied possessing/using marijuana. A search of the vehicle was conducted which yielded a 2.5 gram plastic baggie of suspected marijuana under the armrest and a glass marijuana pipe/bowl in the glove box. The driver admitted to owning the items and was arrested for possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia. The officer issued a citation to the driver for possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia. The driver was held until posting bond on the charges.

HARASSING PHONE CALLS

On February 5th an officer responded to the Bellis Spa on Grand River Avenue for a customer harassing employees over the phone. Upon arrival the manager advised that a customer had received services from the spa, paid for the services, and then later decided he did not like the service provided and wanted his money back. The man began repeatedly harassing employees over the phone when the manager advised him that he could not get his money back. The officer called the man who advised that he was upset with the Brazilian wax that he received from the spa, but didn't notice the poor job done until he got home. The man advised that he would stop calling the business.
