Anyone who drives through the City of Farmington. City of Farmington can see that the dust is not yet settled on the development projects in the City.

Prominently, on the southeast corner of Grand River Avenue and Farmington Road, GLP Financial has moved forward with the redevelopment of Farmington State Savings Bank — formerly the Village Mall.

GLP plans to reconstruct the interior for office use and restore the façade to the look of the original bank building. Just down the road, on the northwest corner of Nine Mile and Farmington Road, Royal Gas and Oil Company is constructing a new service station building and pump island along with other site improvements. The new gas station will be an Amoco is expected to open this fall.

The former 47<sup>th</sup> District Courthouse property on 10 Mile Road is well underway to becoming a new residential community in Farmington. Site development has been completed and the first of 14 new single-family homes is now being constructed. Once completed, Liberty Hill will provide new opportunity for families looking to live in the

The purchase agreement with Robertson Brothers Homes for the Maxfield Training Center has been signed. We are looking forward to 59 condominiums in the downtown on that property.

Two new health food options came into the City this year. Sipp Smoothie and Juice Bar located in the downtown, and Tropical Smoothie at 34675 Grand River Avenue.

The City made updates to Flanders and Drake parks. Drake Park now sports a new parking lot and sidewalk, along with pathways. Preliminary volleyball court construction has been completed as well. In Flanders Park, the City added a paved pathway through the park.

We now have Dearborn Music in the downtown and are looking forward to the return of Browndog. With these, along with other planned developments, the city is moving is moving forward. There is a lot for those who visit our city to see and do. Perhaps this forward momentum is one reason the 2020 Census data shows Farmington's growth at nearly a 12 percent increase over 2010. I know another reason is the welcoming warmth of this community.

Each year the City receives revenue from the State of Michigan from the State's City, Village, and Township Revenue Sharing (CVTRS) program. In order to be eligible to receive this revenue, the City must complete a Certification of Accountability and Transparency, a Citizen's Guide to the City's Finances, a Performance Dashboard, a Debt Service Report, and a Projected Budget Report. ## City introduces leaf-collection app & tips from the Department of Public Works



#### Leaf pickup begins November 1

This information will also remain available on farmgov.com. Please note, that initially,

the app only shows the collection map as posted and does not yet relay where the truck is at any given time.

Leaves should be raked to the curb no sooner than 48 hours before the date of pickup. Any earlier may cause drainage and traffic problems. Leaves should not be raked into the street, but left on the curb. All vehicles should be parked on private property during pickup hours of 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

# What to do after an Emergency Water Main Repair

If you are notified that there is a water main repair in your area and your water is cloudy, run your cold water at a laundry tub until is it clear. The water is safe to drink and does not need to be boiled. You may want to hold off on doing laundry until the water is clear.


#### Shake your mailbox:

Residents who have mailboxes at the road edge should prepare for winter by shaking their mailbox. If the mailbox moves when shaken, it probably won't withstand standard snow-removal operations and should be repaired or replaced before winter. By conducting this simple test now, residents can replace their mailbox before the winter freeze. When snowplows go by, most times, they don't actually touch the mailboxes; however, the force of snow thrown from the roadway is enough to knock down a loose mailbox. Damage can often be prevented by proper routine maintenance. Taking time to tighten screws and secure mailboxes to posts early in the year can reduce winter headaches in the future.

# Automatic debit of water and sewer bills now available

The City will be offering automatic debit of water and sewer bills from customers' checking or savings accounts beginning with the December 15 billing. Automatic debit saves time for both customers and the City, reduces the risk of missed payments and late fees, can build your credit score, and is environmentally friendly. When you sign up for automatic debit, your bill will be emailed to you on or about the 15<sup>th</sup> of each quarter. Then, one week before the due date, a reminder will be emailed

to you with the amount that will be debited from your account. This amount will be debited from your account on the normal due date. There is no City charge for this service.
